We did laugh about the look of our aprons and masks for the German soldiers, but once they were dyed black and worn over the uniforms they became very sinister. I found working on the play extremely moving. Even in rehearsal it brought many tears, I think we all felt that it had brought us very close to you, even those who have not met you. We had two people from the audience get out of their seats at the end of the play, and walk up to the candles, bow their heads and say a prayer for all those who died. The rest of us did the same, although perhaps not so openly.

My job on the night was to operate the computer for the projected graphics. Some were very powerful moving images which, when played with the music became even more so. Hoping to visit you again at Malfiano before too long. We really enjoyed our stay earler this year. Much love,
